Some of those actions also raised eyebrows for their provocative nature or for being blunt, but they focused the spotlight on urgent issues that are truly a matter of life and death for animals. For instance, most people don't bequeath a slice of their buttock - let alone to the prime minister. But my updated will ensured

that Australia's leaders can't ignore the wool industry's mulesing mutilations. Ahead of Easter, when lambs are often on the menu, we barbecued a doll to illustrate the absurdity of eating any mother's baby. One activist brought her actual infant to the demo. And when Prime Minister Albanese contracted COVID-19, we sent him a cheeky get-well card and pointed out that live export increases the risk of pandemics. It read, "Feel better soon, do better now." And a volunteer, wearing a face mask in the PM's likeness, helped us make sure he was represented, along with other world leaders, at a G7 action in Japan. For the flesh-flinging *MasterChef* finale, we suggested that the show add aprons featuring blood spatter and scorch marks from a burning planet. And after a report linked land-clearing

for cattle to habitat loss for endangered koalas, we caused a stir with an "Eating Meat Kills Koalas" billboard in the heart of "beef country". At every turn, the media followed, ensuring even more hearts and minds were reached – plus our more than

PETA Asia filed complaints requesting that authorities cut off the facility's funding and audit the use of public money for cruelty to animals. Nearly every major airline pledged not to transport monkeys to laboratories following PETA entity campaigns, so when Chinese carrier Hainan Airlines reversed its policy, PETA launched a petition demanding it reinstate

cats are still kept in cramped cages and driven mad for novelty coffee. We urged sellers and consumers not to fund such cruelty. After we shared PETA Asia's findings linking coconut milk

subscribers spoke up and the company dropped its supplier. PETA is calling on the Thai ambassador to Australia to help end the enslavement of monkeys. PETA released a stirring animated Christmas advert about a young turkey who escapes from an abattoir-bound truck,

used by HelloFresh to forced

monkey labour in Thailand,

helping viewers understand that these smart, gentle birds are friends, not food. Our "sheep" made a splash at the Parliament House lake in Canberra urging the government **to end live exports**. And we **launched a petition**

targeting the federal minister for agriculture. We shared PETA Asia's latest cashmere **investigation** – which showed frightened goats

being pinned down while their hair was ripped

out, leaving some with bloody wounds - and exposed "sustainable" and "responsible" labelling lies. PETA's exposé implicates Gap Inc, H&M, and Guess - along with other companies using the deceptive "Responsible Down Standard" label

and other marketing gimmicks - in horrific cruelty to birds. We also shared never-before-seen footage showing a worker in a Polish abattoir kicking a duck and many birds being electrocuted. After workers cut their throats, many of them appear still conscious and struggling. Joaquin Phoenix narrated PETA's powerful "Wool in Reverse" video, which traces a wool jumper back to its bloody beginning, generating

As thousands of Ukrainians fled rapidly rising floodwaters resulting from the destroyed Kakhovka dam, rescuers supported by PETA's Global Compassion Fund headed into the danger zone to

save desperate animals. This urgent rescue was on top of the ongoing work rescuing animals and distributing food for dogs, cats, horses, and donkeys in war-torn Ukraine. Since Russia invaded the country in 2022, PETA Germany and its partners have rescued over 15,000 cats and dogs from Ukraine and helped deliver more than 1,400 tonnes of provisions. When earthquakes rocked Syria and Turkey, PETA's Global Compassion Fund was a lifeline for dogs, cats, and other survivors - helping teams to rescue over 300 dogs, cats, birds, and fish.

In Petra, Jordan, **PETA supports a free veterinary clinic** for animals forced to carry tourists on their backs as well as any other animals living in or around Petra. **The** clinic has treated more than 13,000 animals since it

PETA entities have robust spay/neuter programmes underway around the world: • In Romania, PETA Germany and its Romanian partner

group sterilised more than 2,000 dogs and cats

• More than 4,000 cats and dogs were sterilised in the Philippines in 2023, all at no charge to their guardians. • PETA India sterilises dogs and cats rescued by its

emergency response team. In the past three years, PETA India has spayed and neutered more than 2,400 cats and 250 dogs. In Mexico, teams sterilised hundreds of dogs and cats over the course of a few days in

impoverished communities. Since April 2021, more than 2,700 dogs and cats have been sterilised in Cancún and Chichimilá in the Yucatán. • In Peru, in the aftermath of Cyclone Yaku, teams **provided low-cost and free** spay/neuter surgeries as well as food and clean water to about 200 animals. Since 2014, they've sterilised more than 1,500 animals in Peru. In India, PETA-supported Animal Rahat works to gain the trust of animal owners and turn the conversation towards mechanisation – replacing animals forced to pull heavy loads with eco-friendly vehicles or tractors. Animal Rahat mechanisation projects have saved 57,442 bullocks and 284 donkeys from Animal Rahat opened a new sanctuary for donkeys, horses, mules, and other animals in Karnataka. Through its three sanctuaries, the organisation cares for nearly 400 rescued animals.
